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Dear Members,

Welcome to the winter Newsletter.

Apologies for its somewhat later-than-usual issue of the Newsletter but the summer ran in rather quickly after the Castletown and Carton House trip. We hope that you will find the three lectures, including the Christmas lecture on the work of Wilhemina Geddes, an engaging and topical mix. Also organized for the members is a tour of *Francis Bacon: A Terrible Beauty* the major exhibition at the Hugh Lane which celebrates the centenary of Francis Bacon's birth in 63, Lower Baggot Street, Dublin. A projected September trip to Galway to visit some key examples of late nineteenth and early twentieth-century Irish stained-glass in Labane Catholic Church and Loughrea Cathedral has been deferred, however it is being timetabled for early summer next year. Plans are also underway for the spring events and will include a visit to the F.E. McWilliam Gallery & Studio in Banbridge which, time-permitting, could be combined with a visit to the Ulster Museum. The re-opening of the Ulster Museum on 22nd October following its major refurbishment programme is most welcome.

As discussed at the AGM we have started planning for next year's trip and have received ball-park prices for two of the proposed destinations discussed at the meeting – Belgium and Denmark. There is a brief outline of two projected trips on page 3, and we would like to hear if people are interested and which is their preferred destination. Depending on feedback we will complete plans for the country which generates most interest. A final costing and schedule, and of course the all important booking form will be included in the January Newsletter.

Work has been ongoing over the summer on Issue 3 of **Artefact**. On behalf of the membership I would like to thank the Editorial Committee and the external reviewers for all their hard work. Thanks also to all who submitted articles for consideration. Following a rigorous review process five essays and a number of book reviews are currently being edited and prepared for publication.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the two out-going committee members Ciaran Woods and Olive Knox for their tremendous commitment to the IAAH and their wonderful work during their time on the committee. They will be missed at the meetings but I'm sure they will still be regulars at the events. At the same time I would like to welcome on board three new committee members - Audrey Nicholls, a PhD candidate at UCD, Hilary Sexton, a recent graduate of the MPhil programme at the Irish Art Research Centre (TRIARC), and Audrey Whitty, Curator of the Ceramics, Glass and Asian Collections at the National Museum - who are already proving valuable contributors to the committee's work.

MEMORIES OF CHICAGO

IAAH Trip 2009

This year's trip to Chicago saw a small but perfectly formed group brave the late winter/early spring chill of the Windy City! As ever Alan Benson of Sadlier Travel did great work on our behalf, coping brilliantly with the usual flurry of arranging & rearranging, & working some magic with some sites which had yet to 'open' for the season. We were met at O'Hare airport by Beverley Livingston, our excellent guide, who would share with us the history of Chicago & its wonderful artistic & architectural treasures. Over the 6 days we saw a succession of highlights.



As well as paintings, sculptures, decorative arts & stained glass in various museums, we experienced a series of architectural & sculptural gems on the streets of Chicago – within 5 minutes of the hotel were monumental public sculptures by Picasso, Miro, Chagall & Dubuffet. Beverley treated us to a full day tour of Chicago's architectural riches – among them the Auditorium Building, the Rookery, the Chicago Board of Trade Building and Mies Van Der Rohe's Federal Centre. With Beverley we also took in the Frank Lloyd Wright Museum & Home, & his Robie House in Hyde Park, though rain meant the plan to walk the Oak Park neighbourhood viewing the 25 homes Wright designed did not come to fruition. We also journeyed out to Mies' icon of 20th century modern architecture, Farnsworth House in Plano. Though still closed for the winter months we were privileged that Whitney French, the Director, opened up the house and give us a tour.

A day-and-a-half was set aside for taking in the rich & vast collection of the Chicago Art Institute and the exhibition *Becoming Edvard Munch: Influence, Anxiety, and Myth*. The Smith Museum, rather curiously housed among the varied entertainments on Navy Pier, was an unexpected delight. The first museum in the US dedicated solely to stained glass windows its display showcased both secular & religious works, most originally installed in Chicago area residential, commercial & religious buildings. We had opportunity to take in large-scale stained glass works in the form of the ceiling on the 5th floor of the old Marshall Field's Department Store [now Macy's], the largest unbroken example of Tiffany Favrile glass in the world, and in the Chicago Cultural Centre we encountered not only the world's largest Tiffany stained-glass dome but also an unexpected treat in the form of a concert.

We had plenty of occasions for contemporary art visiting, for example, the Museum of Contemporary Art & also the award-winning Millennium Park where, braving melting snow & the cold, we saw Frank Gehry's *Jay Pritzker Pavilion*, the interactive *Crown Fountain* by Jaume Plensa, & Anish Kapoor's iconic *Cloud Gate*.

Aside from the small disappointment of the organized tour of the Smart Museum failing to materialize all seemed to go well & we even had some down-time over drinks in the Signature Lounge on the 96th floor of the John Hancock Center, & in the delightful grandeur of the Beaux-Arts lobby of the Palmer House Hotel. Thanks to all on the trip for their enthusiasm.

Proposals for the IAAH trip - 2010

We are looking for expressions of interest for either Belgium OR Denmark. We will proceed to finalise plans for the country which garners most interest & will circulate full details in the January newsletter.

1. **Belgium – €1,050 [approx. – twin accommodation]**. Finalized cost will include flights, taxes, 4-star accommodation [6 nights], coach, tours, and entrances. Proposed itinerary would take in Brussels, home for example to the the Musées royaux des Beaux-Arts and also to splendid examples of Art Nouveau architecture; the van Eyck *Altarpiece of the Lamb* in Ghent; Rubens in Antwerp; various highlights of Bruges including the Groeningemuseum, the Hospitaal museum, & Michelangelo's *Bruges Madonna*; the Museum of Fine Arts in Tournai; and the 'Groot Begijnhof' & the St Pieterskerk Treasury in Louvain.

1. **Denmark – €1,300/€1,400 [approx. depending on whether 3 or 4 star – twin accommodation]**. Finalized cost will include flights, taxes, 6 nights' accommodation, coach, tours, and entrances. Proposed itinerary would see us based in Copenhagen where sights include the Amalienborg Palace, the Ny Carlsberg Glyptotek & the Thorvaldsens Museum. Trips outside of the capital could take us to the Louisiana Museum of Modern Art; the ARoS Aarhus Kunstmuseum; & the Gothic Cathedral & Viking Museum in Roskilde.
