Marking the 150th anniversary of the NGI, this exhibition coincides with the launch of the book 'Lines of Vision: Irish Writers on Art' edited by Janet McLean. Fifty-six Irish writers and poets have selected images from the collection, including works by Caravaggio, Rembrandt, Vermeer, Monet, Bonnard, Paul Henry, Mary Swanzy and Jack B. “Debates in Canadian Art, 1900-1950: Modernist Currents in a Cold Country”

Professor Brian Foss, Carleton University Ottawa

Brian Foss is the 2014-15 Craig Dobbin Visiting Chair in Canadian Studies at University College Dublin while on leave from his regular job as Professor of Art History and Director of the School for Studies in Art and Culture at Carleton University in Ottawa. He specializes in Canadian art and in twentieth-century British art, and has curated several exhibitions. These include retrospectives of the work of such early twentieth-century Canadian painters as Mary Hiester Reid (Art Gallery of Ontario, 2000) and Edwin Holgate (Musée des Beaux-Arts de Montréal, 2005). He is currently co-curating an exhibition of Montreal modernist painting for the Musée des Beaux-Arts de Montréal (2015). He is also the co-author of *The Visual Arts in Canada: The Twentieth Century* (Oxford University Press, 2010), and the sole author of *War Paint: Art, War, State and Identity in Britain 1939-45* (Yale University Press, 2007).

Royal Irish Academy.

Friday 21st Nov: 'Where is Art History Today? The Art and Architecture of Ireland in Context'. A one-day symposium being held in conjunction with the publication for the Royal Irish Academy by Yale University Press of *The Art and Architecture of Ireland*. The result of a research project sponsored by Royal Irish Academy, this five-volume reference work is a landmark in the writing of the history of the art and architecture of the island since 1200. Simonds-Gooding's work is in the best Modernist sense, reductivist. Oct 11- Jan 2015: Into the Field. An invitation to encounter the inner world of feelings through the lens of a live field of contemporary art practice, dissolving the boundaries between artist and viewer. Light, colour and sound gently collide within a myriad of objects, video, installation, colour studies and soundscapes that move between material and immaterial worlds. New works by artist Odey Curbelo and composer Norbert Vollath, together with works by William McKeown and Jack B. Yeats will be placed in dialogue with each other. The theme of colour and light will be anchored by Olafur Eliasson's Colour Circle Series, a quiet interruption at the centre of the experience.
